Rev. Wayne convened the meeting with a prayer at 11:48 A.M.

**August Minutes**

It was moved by Marcia and seconded by Bernice to accept the August minutes. Motion passed.

**Rector's Time**

Discussion regarding creation of a parish administrator position (expanded secretarial position). The majority opinion was that if this position were created it should be filled by a non-parishioner.

**Pastoral Concerns**

Pat Claussen's son has been hospitalized. John Lauffer seemed to have had a better week. George Clapp is doing well and his spirits are good.

**Building and Grounds**

Marcia will hold a meeting on Saturday for those interested in buildings and grounds. The following items were presented by Marcia:

Money is need for the plexiglass to cover the stained glass windows – we await a proposal from Cathedral Crafts; their rep also estimated that our windows are valued at around \$10,000 each – Wayne will check on our insurance policy to ensure we are well covered

The north side of the church needs to be power-washed and painted

Kendall Klumpp has hired someone to fix parts of the church roof

Gutters need to be cleaned (there is some money in the budget for maintenance and special maintenance projects)

Kendall put the railing up in front of the Parish Hall-thank you!

**Building Use Proposal**

Wayne presented a building use guideline sheet complete with usage rules and suggested donations. A refundable clean-up fee was mentioned as well as suggested donations for recurring events.



## **Christian Education**

Tom indicated that Sunday School for Adults is going well; attendance changes weekly. He will be gone at times over the next two months and is getting substitutes.

## **Outreach**

The Goodrow Brunch will be held on October 15 from 10 A.M. until 2 P.M. at the Shepherd Bar and Restaurant. We hope to have an even better turn out than last year.

## **Construction Update**

David said that the Health Inspection was finished three weeks ago. If food is brought in for an event, a license is not necessary. A one-time license is \$90.00 for cooking food for an event. A full year's license is \$325.00 plus two certified people have to be available during the event. We need to clarify cooking food versus warming it up (thinking especially when we host our homeless guests). We need an air trap under the sink if we are to obtain a yearlong health certificate.

The building inspector said that panic bars on the new lantern doors are needed. To do this on these new custom doors would be very tricky and expensive; questions of responsibility – City? GLBC? St. John's?

The redesign of the memorial gardens should be finished in a couple of weeks.

David will need help moving the statue of St. Francis; Wayne will contact a fraternity.

## **Finances**

Clancy went over the financial statements. At the end of August our pledges were down by approximately \$5,000.00. Audits must be done annually, usually at a cost of \$5,000.00.

## **Adjourn**

For the next meeting, Ulana requested the procedures for getting a new Rector. Wayne will follow up.

It was moved by Tom and seconded by Adam to adjourn the meeting. Motion passed. The meeting was adjourned at 1:15 P.M.

## Anglican Worthies

322. Bronte, Charlotte (1815-1855)  
Novelist (pt. vi)

One of the tasks that came from Charlotte's trip to London was to prepare a second edition of *Wuthering Heights*. At the same time, rumors circulated that she was about to marry. Back in Haworth she asked Ellen, "Whom am I to marry? I think I have scarcely seen a man with whom such a vision would be possible since I left London." It is thought the rumor concerned James Taylor, departed for India, a man her father thought worth further consideration. George Smith, her publisher, was a possibility. He went so far as to invite her to accompany his family on a cruise up the Rhine which, tempting, she declined. Gérin adds that Smith "had a gift for infusing her with life."

At home in Yorkshire she struggled with familiar difficulties—toothaches, diminished energy, lingering grief for her sisters, and solitude, the manse with only her aged father, who relied more and more on her. "I had calculated," she wrote to George Williams, "that when shut out from every enjoyment, every stimulus but what could be derived from intellectual exertion, my mind would rouse itself perforce. It is not so. Even intellect, even imagination, will not dispense with the ray of domestic cheerfulness, with the gentle spur of a family discussion. Evenings with the early darkness of northern England, were worse; then she remembered Emily and Anne. (The reader of Charlotte's correspondence cannot help but notice how little her father appears in her more revealing words to Ellen and other friends. He worked alone in his study, his feelings unknown.) To Harriet Martineau she confessed, "I think I would rather hire myself out as a governess than write against the grain, or out of the mood. I am not like you, who have no bad days. I have had bad days, bad weeks, aye! Bad months."

Despite what she said to Harriet, the only way Charlotte knew to combat solitude and grief was to write. She began work on *Villette*, a reworking, so call it, of her miserable experience in Brussels six years before. Gérin says, "Thus marks the end of the road back from Brussels (it is Charlotte's noble valediction to her one-time 'Master,' but it is a book about the present)." If it is that, it is about Charlotte's state of mind in 1851, and she is an entirely different woman, if the modifications of her emotional is any indication.

In this novel the protagonist is a young girl who has obtained employment teaching English in a Belgian *pensionnat* and baby-sitting younger children. Lucy Snow is an orphan but is protected by her godmother. Her situation nominally resembles the circumstances Charlotte found herself in 1843, but in *Villette* there are significant differences. The character of the hated Mme. Heger is muted; Mme. Beck is as clever and practical but hardly mean, and treats the protagonist with occasional sympathy and respect. Lucy copes with several love-interests, but the important one, the instructor Paul Emmanuel, is single (!), and his behavior is anti-social, manipulative, disagreeable, and unpleasant. He is misogynist as well, and mentally not healthy, much worse than M. Heger. While this novel has drawn considerable respect among scholars, it is not, in my view, very satisfactory. It is deficient in the essential artistic ingredient of plot and conflict. Much of the narrative consists only of Lucy's critical observations of the behavior of others. Unlike Charlotte herself, Lucy is given many opportunities to enjoy the culture of Brussels, and while she is lonely



and powerless, wanting love, she is also an astute of her pupils and colleagues. Moreover, it is difficult to appreciate the work as a novel while conscious of its autobiographical backstory. Despite the transformation of the characters of the principals, there is still the core of the past dominating the narrative, the intense and unequal relationship between master and pupil; this is what Charlotte wanted to write about. In the end, after professing his love for Lucy, M. Emanuel takes off for the West Indies for several years to straighten out his family's plantation, leaving Lucy the promise to marry when he returns. He dies in a shipwreck; Charlotte does not reward Lucy's s faithfulness.

When Charlotte was last in London, she attended mass at a Catholic church and a Quaker meeting, but whether her faith was deepening is not certain. Nevertheless, there is a distinct "providential" feel about *Villette*. At one point Lucy says, "It seemed to me that at this hour there was affection and sorrow in Heaven above for all pain suffered on earth beneath; the weight of being no more loved—no more owned, half-yielded to hope of the contrary." George Eliot, the author of *Middlemarch* (1871), found *Villette* more satisfying than *Jane Eyre*. "There is something almost preternatural in its power." But in the absence of any feedback from her sisters, she had misgivings; she wrote to her publishers, "I can hardly tell you, how I hunger to hear some opinion beside my own, and how I have sometimes desponded and almost despaired, because there was no one to read a line to, or of whom to ask a counsel." *Jane Eyre* and *Shirley* were not written under such circumstances.

After *Villette*, the final episode of her life is her marriage. For a woman whose standard, against whom she judged all suitors, was not Rochester but Constantin Heger, her prospects in her mid-thirties in the Yorkshire moors must have seemed remote. Arthur Bell Nichols, her father's Irish curate, had proposed to her; he had been part of the household since Branwell's collapse. Romantically he seemed "unobjectionable," which is about the worst one can say about any suitor. Her father objected because he thought Nichols socially beneath the family, and sent him away. But Nichols was persistent. They resumed correspondence behind her father's back. She did not love Nichols, but she did not dislike him.

The curate who succeeded Nichols was so unsatisfactory that Patrick Bronte brought Nichols back, the young man giving up a position that paid £200 a year for Haworth, which paid only £90. But he was, as I said, determined. Charlotte finally consented, and they were married 25 June, 1854. Ellen Nussey and Margaret Wooler, Charlotte's former schoolmistress, were in attendance. (Her father would not marry her, partly because of his personal disapproval, partly because he had come to disapprove of the appropriate liturgy in the Prayer Book and refused to marry anyone!) They were united by someone else.

Charlotte found that she did not mind domestic life that much; she liked the routine. And she began another novel (now lost). (Her husband did not care for either Ellen Nussey or Mrs. Gaskell, a Dissenter.) In November, taking a walk. Charlotte caught cold. In the beginning of 1855, after a holiday trip to her husband's family, she was not well. And she was pregnant, suffering the usual maladies of her altered condition. That same month Tabby, the housekeeper, who had been at Haworth since 1825, died, leaving Patrick, the aging father, destitute of familiar help. Charlotte never made it to spring; she died, during a violent storm, March 31. --hlf
