# Our Worship Space...

As I announced a few weeks ago, beginning on Palm Sunday, we will celebrate the Eucharist at the large altar in the sanctuary behind the altar/communion rail, through the feast of Pentecost. Sometime during the Easter season, we will have a parish "Forum" so that we can talk about our worship space and our prayer.

Part of our conversation certainly will involve our 'feelings' about the two different arrangements – the current one and the one beginning Palm Sunday. But our conversation should also include awareness of what these arrangements "say" about our beliefs, and the reasoning behind how things have been or are arranged.

To give us some background, here is a "repeat" of a column we published in the May/June 2022 Evangel.

#### NOW YOU KNOW...

One of the things COVID did was make the use of the altar rails (or communion rails) for receiving communion an unsafe practice. While some folks are longing for a return to using the altar rails, there are as many who prefer coming forward in procession without using the rails.

How did the use of altar rails get started? Why have we used them? Here is what the Episcopal Church website has to tell us about ALTAR RAILS:

#### Altar Rails

Chest-high rails around the altar were used as early as the fifth century to prevent the people from interfering with the ministers of the eucharist. The people came to the altar rails to receive the sacrament, which meant that the altar rails served as communion rails. Some places continued the early church practice of administering communion by ministers who moved among the people. Standing was the normal posture for receiving communion until the thirteenth century, when kneeling to receive the sacrament became customary. This practice was related to the elevation of the host by the celebrant. Altar rails were first used in England during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I. The Puritans disliked altar rails. They often removed them from churches and moved the altar into the body of the church. William Laud (1573-1645), Archbishop of Canterbury, directed that altars be returned to the east wall of churches and fenced by altar rails for protection against desecration. The altar rails were latticed. Bishop Wren of Norwich noted that they were "so thick with pillars that doggs may not gett in." The English clergy continued to move among the people to administer the sacraments until the eighteenth century, when the altar rail came to be used as the communion rail. In the nineteenth century, the chancel was seen as the room for the sacrament and the nave was seen as the room for the liturgy of the word. Altar rails in the Episcopal Church are low, reflecting the assumption that the people will kneel to receive communion. Altar rails may be made of metal or wood. Current liturgical usage has emphasized the shared participation of celebrant and people in the eucharist, and tended to remove barriers between the altar and the congregation. Standing to receive the sacrament is practiced with increasing frequency, and altar rails have been removed from some churches. Altar rails may become obsolete as standing to receive communion becomes more widespread in the Episcopal Church. https://www.episcopalchurch.org/glossary/altar-rails

Meeting called to order at 11:38 am.

Nancy commented on how nice it is to be meeting in person again and welcomed everyone to the table.

Pat led the group in an opening prayer.

Meeting minutes from Dec 11, 2022 and Jan 15, 2023 were reviewed, no changes suggested. Dan moved to accept the minutes as written, Mary seconded. All approved.

Ken Klumpp attended the meeting to address the Vestry with a concern about the altar placement and why he would like to see it returned to its original configuration. Choir in front of the organ pipes and the altar behind the altar rail allowing for a free flow of people to the alter for communion. He shared his experiences in St Johns and the beauty that the configuration offers parishioners and asked Diane and the Vestry to prayerfully consider his plea. The Vestry thanked him for his thoughts and agreed to discuss this matter during new business.

#### **Property Committee**

• Security – Jerry noted that he and other members of St Johns have come to the church after hours and found one or more doors unlocked or locked but not latched. The door off the parking lot going into the Lantern being the most common. Clancy shared that this door was retrofitted with a panic bar after installation due to fire code and it has not worked properly ever since. Several options including fixing doors, installing cameras and other security measures were discussed and Kevin made a motion to create a committee to investigate and bring recommendations back to the Vestry for consideration. Lara seconded the motion and all approved. Jerry, Kevin and Lara will be the initial members of this committee.

- Authorization to Spend Jerry noted that he would like to have authorization to spend some level of funds without approval from Vestry. He used a recent Clean & Bright example where the Gift in Kind of \$500 fell short of the purchase price for a new washing machine. A motion was made to give Junior Warden authorization to spend up to \$500 w/o Vestry approval and up to \$1000 with Senior Warden approval. This motion was tabled in favor of reviewing church Bylaws before the next Vestry meeting to determine if such a motion can be made. Dan offered to help.
- Storm window Nancy noted that there was a storm window on the Rectory that needed attention and Jerry had already taken care of it.

## Worship Committee

- Several members of this committee will not be serving in 2023 due to the limited focus on the Family Services. What classifies as a Family Service was discussed for new members and the next committee meeting is being planned.
  - Targeting 5 Family services total in 2023.
  - A Family Service will be an activity plus Potluck with a short Compline or similar worship service at the end. Advertisement to the community will be done.
- Lent
  - Two Ash Wednesday services, 12pm and 6pm EST
  - Lenten Series will return Soup & a Movie format. 6:30pm EST in Parish Hall and films by John Dominic Crossan will be shown
  - In person + Zoom, 3/29 will be Zoom only due to Restoration House

#### Outreach Committee

- Gearing up to reach out for Easter families, Nancy to help
- Restoration House
  - DJ noted that the shelter needs help, DJ to meet with Executive Director on Sun Feb 19
  - Discussion about privacy concerns and the reduced numbers served during host week #1 in 2022 because of no curtains on Parish Hall windows and restrictions on having anyone sleep in that space.

## **Education Committee**

- Safe Church training is required by any parishioner who will be serving in the name of St. Johns.
  - Includes Vestry, Eucharistic Visitors, Restoration House and Clean & Bright Volunteers
  - Lara will maintain the list of individuals who have completed it
- Sunday School Series Diocesan provided curriculum is available. Diocese covers ½ the cost. Lenten Series purchased (\$150) to trial before deciding on future purchases or commitments. It follows the Episcopal Lectionary year and is written by a group of diverse young individuals.
- Vacation Bible School? should we give this a try the summer of 2023 to draw in new members? Weeklong event could be kicked off with a picnic on Sunday, children attend part days Mon Fri concluding with a Family Service and an opportunity for attendees to "showcase" what they did during the week.

#### Parish Life/Social Committee

- 2023 Loons Game Sunday June 11, 2023, 1:05pm EST, Dow Diamond, Faith & Family Day
  - Announcement to go in the bulletin, on the website, etc. to start generating interest
  - We will have a Luxury Suite to address feedback from last year regarding ability to mingle and visit easily with all attendees. Indoor/outdoor option will also help to draw in any individuals who would not otherwise attend due to potential for heat/humidity and exposure to the elements.

## Administrative Committee

- Q1 Income/Expenses down but that is normal in a new year. Clancy noted nothing alarming.
- Isabella Bank & Trust Endowment Fund is being moved to the new Diocese investment fund. Collective fund will generate larger buying power and investment portfolio opportunities. Name is "St John's Mt Pleasant Endowment Fund" and paperwork was signed. Investment policy is available in the office with the Vestry notes.
- Church Audit Eastern and Western Diocese will be doing the audit together. Eastern is light years ahead in terms of its documentation practices and Clancy noted that the Western Diocese cannot be relaxed about this any longer.

- New audit procedure/policy needs to be put together (after April 15 tax day)
- Option to outsource or appoint parish members to be part of this audit
- Diane noted that there is a group of Diocesan individuals who will help with our reviews. It was suggested that we try this option before spending the ~\$1,500 to outsource.

## Rector's Report/New Business

- Altar placement in response to Ken's presentation, Diane handed out a copy of The Church for Common Prayer, which describes how "our space" should be built. There have been many changes to the beliefs on this topic over the years, but Diane feels strongly about the current set up but wants the Vestry and Parish to prayerfully consider all options. A future "Chat & Chew" forum will be set up during coffee hour to allow the Parish to weigh in. Dan agreed to facilitate this discussion.
- Succession Planning Alice noted the importance of having summary documents for each operational role to allow a new person to transition into each role more effectively. Electronic copies will be kept in the office and can be updated as needed. Plans will be made to contact those currently in these roles in 2023.
- Drop-off/Loading/Un-loading Sign it was asked if such a sign makes sense for the front of the church to keep a space clear to allow for drop-offs. After discussion, it was suggested that this makes more sense in the back of the church by the Parish Hall/Lantern entrance.
- Vestry Retreat Vestry will gather sometime in March/April in the Parish Hall instead of going away somewhere. Several individuals thought that it would be important to stay "home" to ensure that all considerations on things like altar placement can take place. Chat & Chew forum to be scheduled before the Retreat so all comments/feedback can be considered.

Next meeting March 12, 2023

Pat led the closing prayer.

DJ moved to adjourn, Olivia seconded, all approved. Meeting adjourned at 1:35 pm
